Have you ever had moments like that? Times when you simply overlooked the obvious. I suppose everyone has at one time or another. Some of those moments make us laugh while others bring embarrassment and even shame. That was true of me with grace. So much of my early preaching was devoted to exposing doctrinal and moral error that I had overlooked the most important "issue" of all — grace. Though I touched on it from time to time, it was more of a supporting actor than the main star. It had a small role but never dominated the script. Thankfully, I have since learned that grace must be center stage or the entire production is skewed.

The gospel is the message of God's grace bestowed on sinners through Jesus Christ. That is why it is referred to as "the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24) and "the word of his grace" (Acts 14:3; 20:32), and why those who heard "the gospel" were said to have heard "the grace of God in truth" (Colossians 1:5-6). Moreover, we are saved by grace (Ephesians 2:8), called by grace (2 Timothy 1:9), justified by grace (Titus 3:7), and strengthened by grace (Hebrews 13:9). Therefore, it is vitally important that we give grace the attention it deserves.

Grace puts the "good" in Good News. It provides healing to those who hurt, help to those who struggle, and hope to those who despair. It straightens crooked paths, softens hardened hearts, sustains wearied minds, and saves lost souls. Grace is God's answer to man's problems!
